MEET OUR TUTORS





Kirsten Williams OAM is Concertmaster of the Canberra Symphony Orchestra and one of Australia's leading violinists. She studied with Alice Waten at the Sydney Conservatorium and Igor Ozim in Switzerland before joining the Royal Opera House Orchestra at Covent Garden and the Academy of St Martin in the Fields. On returning to Australia, she was appointed Associate Leader of the Australian Chamber Orchestra and later Associate Concertmaster of the Sydney Symphony Orchestra.

Her versatility as a soloist and chamber musician both in Australia and overseas extends to her passion for music for healing, and she has recorded two much-acclaimed albums with American harpist Jane Rosenson.

A key figure in the CSO's Kingsland Pathways Program, Kirsten also works with the Sydney and Australian youth orchestras and teaches at the ANU School of Music. Her contributions to the CSO and ACT arts community were recognised with the Governor-General's Medallion (2021), and most recently when she received the Medal of the Order of Australia in the King's Birthday Honours.



Lindy Reksten cello

After completing a music degree at the Tasmanian Conservatorium of Music, Lindy undertook postgraduate studies at the University of Music in Detmold, German and was a full-time member of the orchestra at the Landestheater in Detmold. She taught cello at various music schools and worked as a mentor for cello pedagogy students at the University of Music in Detmold.

After returning to Australia, Lindy established a busy teaching practice in Canberra. She attends teaching masterclasses and workshops in Australia and overseas, including several international cello festivals. She performs regularly with the CSO and many other music organisations.

Lindy has a particular interest in supporting developing young musicians. She established the pre-tertiary chamber music program at the ANU Community Music Centre, was involved in the development of the ANU Orchestra and has held various roles at Music for Canberra. She is also the CSO's Orchestral Development Liaison, working in the Kingsland Pathways Program.

Greg Stenning trumpet

Greg Stenning enjoys an extensive career as a music educator and performer. He has performed with the Opera Australia Orchestra, Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Australian Chamber Orchestra and Australian World Orchestra, and his association with the CSO stretches back more than a decade. As a soloist, he has performed the Ewazen and Addison concertos, and he has an extensive recital repertoire.

Brass ensemble music has been a passion since his exposure to the Philip Jones Brass Ensemble as a child, and he is now known for his conducting work with symphonic wind orchestras and brass bands, leading many of Canberra's community music groups for concerts and competitions.

Greg is also heavily involved in music education, bringing more than 40 years' experience as a classroom teacher, ensemble director and freelancer trumpeter, and he uses a Kodaly-based approach to inspire his students.

Bjorn Pfeiffer tuba

Bjorn Pfeiffer is Principal Tuba of the Band of the Royal Military College. During his 28-year career, he has held section and group leader roles with Army bands in Adelaide, Brisbane, Wagga Wagga and Canberra, appeared as a featured soloist with the band, toured to Switzerland, France and Turkey, and performed for many international heads of state, including Queen Elizabeth II and the President of the United States.

Bjorn has been Principal Tuba of the CSO since 2011, and has also played as a guest of the Adelaide Symphony and Opera Australia orchestras. As a freelancer, he has performed and recorded with top Australian artists such as the Whitlams, Kate Miller-Heidke, Kate Ceberano and John Farnham, and in 2024 he played tuba for the Canberra run of *Chicago*. He looks forward to releasing his first solo album.

In addition to his role developing the next generation of brass players through the CSO Kingsland Pathways program, Bjorn also teaches at ANU.


